October – Month of the Rosary – PRAY!

When we pray the Rosary, we are asking Mary to help us better understand the meaning of the life, death and resurrection of Jesus. Praying the Rosary is like going to Mary and saying:

- “Tell me the story of Jesus”
- “Tell me about his birth”
- “Tell me about how he died”
- “Tell me about his rising from the dead.”

Each of the mysteries of the Rosary tells us part of the story of Jesus and gives us clues as to how we can live our lives. For example, as we think about the story of Mary visiting Elizabeth, we may decide to get in touch with someone we haven't heard from in years. Or as we pray the mystery of Jesus in Gethsemani, we may ask God to help us accept what we cannot change. “Tell me a story.” The next time we pray the Rosary, we may want to begin with those words!

Twenty-eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time October 8/9, 2016 In today's gospel, we hear of the ten men afflicted with lep-rosy, and the one who glorifies God for being healed. It is a dramatic scene of gratitude. But in order for the miracle to happen in the first place, these men had to start walking in faith before their diseased conditions changed one tiny bit. Good stewards of their faith realize that they cannot wait until their problems are over to start walking in faith. They praise God even in the darkest of nights, and in the worst of circumstances. Do we walk in faith, giving the Lord our gratitude even when we are in difficult circumstances?

“Only those who have the patience to do simple things perfectly will acquire the skill to do difficult things easily!”

When you carve your “pumpkin”, think of this prayer.
The Pumpkin Prayer –

Dear God,
As I carve my pumpkin help me say this prayer:
Open my mind so I can learn about you;
(Cut the top of the pumpkin)
Take away all my sin and forgive me for the wrong things I do. (Clean out the inside)
Open my eyes so Your love I will see;
(cut eyes shaped like hearts)
I'm sorry for turning up my nose to all You've given me.
(Cut a nose in the shape of the cross)
Open my ears so Your word I will hear;
(Cut ears shaped like the Bible)
Open my mouth so I can tell others You're near.
(Cut the mouth in the shape of a fish)
Let your light shine in all I say and do! Amen.
(Place a candle inside and light it)

In the Collect today we pray: “make us always determined to carry out good works.” I need to be on the lookout. The need for good works abounds.
