LITURGICAL COLORS and what they mean. **GREEN**-A sign of hope. This color is used at all Masses throughout the year when no special Mass or feast is celebrated. As Christians we are confidently hoping for the coming of Christ. WHITE-A sign of joy. This color is used at all the solemnities (Easter, Christmas, etc.) feasts and Masses of the Blessed Virgin, feasts and memorials of saints who are not martyrs, weddings, funerals, baptisms, devotions and other Masses for special occasions. VIOLET-A sign of penance. It is used for Masses during Advent and Lent and of wither individual or communal celebrations of the sacrament of penance. RED-a sign of blood or fire. It is used for feasts and memorials of martyrs who shed their blood for the faith. It is also used on Pentecost Sunday, at the sacrament of confirmation, and at Masses of the Holy Spirit as a reminder of the tongues of fire which indicated the coming of the Holy Spirit on the apostles of the first Pentecost. —Prayer Book.
