Today is the national collection for the **Catholic Campaign for Human Development (CCHD)**, which serves as the U.S. bishops' anti -poverty initiative. Helping our brothers and sisters living on the margins has always been a key element of Catholic social teaching. I'm reminded of Pope Francis' words when he visited a homeless shelter in Rome: "To love God and neighbor is not something abstract, but profoundly concrete: it means seeing in every person the face of the Lord to be served, to serve him concretely." (*Visit at the "Dono di Maria" homeless shelter: Meeting with the Missionaries of Charity, the poor and volunteers, May 21, 2013*) It's important to remember that 25% of the CCHD collection stays within our diocese to be distributed through grants to local organizations whose mission is to help the marginalized. Let me tell you about one of those groups. Children's Art and Recreation Enrichment Services (C.A.R.E.S.) in Pembroke Township provides community events focused on arts, recreation and education for children and families. The organization's "Focus on the Family" project features monthly classes centered on parenting skills that conclude with a family meal. Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe, Solemnity – 20 November 2022 2 Samuel 5:1-3. Psalm 122:1-2, 3-4, 4-5. Colossians 1:12-20. Luke 23:35-43. **No sneering, no jeering.** Jesus is dying. He is sneered, jeered, and abused by those who gather round. A king on a cross. It may not be what we expect – but he is the one in whom we believe. As with Jesus, how will I trust that death is not the end for me? How will I treat no one with contempt? Let us sing of the **fullness of Christ** by rereading Colossians 1:12-20 each day this week.
