LITURGICAL COLORS and what they mean. GREEN-A sign of hope. This color is used at all Masses throughout the year when no special Mass or feast is celebrated. As Christians we are confidently hoping for the coming of Christ. WHITE-A sign of joy. This color is used at all the solemnities (Easter, Christmas, etc.) feasts and Masses of the Blessed Virgin, feasts and memorials of saints who are not martyrs, weddings, funerals, baptisms, devotions and other Masses for special occasions. VIOLET-A sign of penance. It is used for Masses during Advent and Lent and of wither individual or communal celebrations of the sacrament of penance. RED-a sign of blood or fire. It is used for feasts and memorials of martyrs who shed their blood for the faith. It is also used on Pentecost Sunday, at the sacrament of confirmation, and at Masses of the Holy Spirit as a reminder of the tongues of fire which indicated the coming of the Holy Spirit on the apostles of the first Pentecost. —Prayer Book.

Join the diocesan mission trip to the Navajo Nation in June- The Diocese of Joliet is pleased to announce its U.S. mission program in June with a two-week trip to the Navajo Nation located near Chinle, Arizona. The June 3-16 trip will focus on construction projects for residents of the reservation, with volunteers helping with such jobs as framing a house, tearing down dilapidated buildings, repairing fencing, etc. "It's not just going to work for the people, but to be with them and experience their life and culture," said diocesan missions coordinator Bruce Carlson. The diocese has organized mission trips to the reservation since 2002. Second Sunday in Ordinary Time – 15 January 2023 Isaiah 49:3, 5-6. Psalm 40:2, 4, 7-8, 8-9, 10. 1 Corinthians 1:1-3. John 1:29 -34. What Baptism Makes of Us. We begin Ordinary Times this liturgical year full of baptismal reminders. Jesus ranks ahead of John the Baptist and all of us. But though greater, he, in his good Spirit, remains with all of us. In Baptism, we are God's servants, ordained to show God's glory (and not our own), and be about God's saving plan. And like Saint Paul and the Corinthians, we are called to be holy. How will I cherish Baptism today and rest in Christ loving me? How will I manifest God's glory in some simple word or work? How will I be holier today than I was yesterday?
